


Panorama Portfolio Map

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Pilgrim's Rest Experience:
Keep your gold when Gold Panning as a 'digger' at the Diggings Museum. This is a 5-hour, all ages, tour that also includes a welcome drink, daily glimpse of a mine managers life and a game of croquet. Bookings: 013 764 1177 / 013 767 1886
Golfing at Pilgrim's Rest 9-hole Golf Course with its sandstone club house (constructed from the material of a school in Rustenburg - each stone was numbered and brought here for re-construction).
Overnight Hikes in the region to be booked with KomatiLand on 013 754 2724. These are:
* Peach Tree Creek Circular (21km, 2 nights)
* Black Hill (44km, 2 nights)
* Prospector's/Morgenzon (57km, 4 nights)
* Peach Creek (21km, 1 night)

Mount Sheba 1958m
Mount Sheba, A Forever Lodge
Premier forest-birding location. An excellent network of walking trails provide good access to the forest and bird watching opportunities.

Mauchsberg 2115m
The Mauchsberg Mountain was named after **Karel Gottlieb Mauch (1837-1875)**, a German explorer and geographer of Africa. He had prophecies about the presence of Gold through the escarpment below the Drakensberg Range of the old Transvaal. Pioneers and eager prospectors like Button, Sutherland, McLachlan and George Parsons took his predictions very seriously.

Mount Moodie 2072m
Mount Moodie was named after **George P. Moodie (1829-1891)**, a surveyor, who assisted Karel Mauch in surveying the Long Tom Pass in 1870 and founder of Moodie's Gold Mining and Exploration Company. Moodie's Reef briefly became the most important goldfield in South Africa early in 1884.

Sabie
The town of Sabie derives its name from the Shangaan word 'ulusaba' meaning 'the river of fear' due to all the crocodiles found when the river was in flood.

Fig Tree Plateau
In 1871, during a hunting expedition led by **Henry Thomas Glynn**, a stray bullet chipped a rock in the area and revealed a rich gold reef which started the gold rush into the area.

Blydepoort Trails (2 to 5km)
The Resort has 3 well laid out walks between 2 and 5km. These are the Kadishi, Leonard and Guinea Fowl trails.

The Blyde River Canyon Nature Reserve
View point of Three Rondavels
The Three Rondavels resembles thatched huts. The Pedi Tribe named the three hills after three wives of the Pulana Tribe Chief, Maripi Mashile who conquered the Swazi Tribe. The tall peak behind them was called Mapjareng, also named after Maripi; meaning 'The Chief'.

Blyde Canyon, A Forever Resort
Road via the Abel Erasmus Pass to Hoedspruit

Drakensberg Mountains
Stunning views of the Lowveld beyond, Blyde River Canyon and the Blyde Dam.

Bourke's Luck Potholes Granite Hill 1581m
The Potholes was named after Bernard Thomas Bourke, known as Tom, together with his brother owned the company Bourke & Co., which fitted out prospecting parties and other general dealings, such as buying property. He was a keen prospector and bought farms in the area and formed the Bourke's Luck Mining Company (1908).

Belvedere Day Walk (10km)
The walk starts at Bourke's Luck and ends in the Blyde River Canyon at the old Belvedere Hydro Electric Power Station. In 1911 it was the largest hydro electric power station in the Southern Hemisphere. It provided Pilgrim's Rest and adjacent communities with electricity. Pilgrim's Rest was the second town in South Africa, besides Kimberley, with street electricity. Most satisfying walk in the region and rated moderately difficult. Tel: 013 753 3115

Walking Trails:
Hiking trails vary from easy walks to grueling hikes over several days.
Day Walks: Forest Fall Nature Walk, Secretary Bird Walk, Loerie Trail, Misty Mountain Trail.
Permits for day walks are available at the Forestry Museum in Sabie.
Overnight Hikes: Hartebeesvlakte 2 Nights Trail, Bonnet/MacMac Pools 2 Days Trail, Bridal Veil 2 Nights Trail, Maritzbos Circular 3 Nights Trail, Fanie Botha 3 Days Trail, Mount Moodie 4 Nights Trail, Fanie Botha 5 Nights Trail, Prospector's Hiking Trail ranging from 2- to 4 Nights Trails.

Graskop
The first gold rush site in SA, in 1873 near Graskop, was named the New Caledonian Gold Fields by President Burgers, who also referred to the area, in a joking manner, as 'MacMac' - he noticed that so many of the diggers' names started with 'Mac' and 'Mc'.
